Anti-American riots that have spread to more than a dozen countries across the Middle East are a sign of fissures between radical and more moderate Islamists that are vying for power as their societies undergo change, Middle East experts say.
- 2. Navy Safe Harbor program pairs injured with mentors to help get ready for next step. After stepping on an IED in Afghanistan, Navy corpsman Redmond Ramos faced an agonizing choice a week later: have his shattered left leg amputated or try to save what was left.

- 5. Veterans need assistance with mental health, homeless issues. Muncie Star Press MUNCIE Travis Field from the Indiana Department of Veteran's Affairs' Indianapolis office reminds everyone he meets to thank veterans for their service. They are not ... So, it's no wonder the homeless and suicide numbers started to increase among us.
- **6.** VFW Post works to meet needs of Tuscaloosa veterans. Tuscaloosa News VFW Post 6022 assists all veterans by filing claims with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, registering veterans with the VA hospital and submitting evaluations for disability claims. If a time should come when a veteran needs to go to the ...
- 7. Vets Benefits To Be Exempt From Sequestration. Military Times "Veterans' disability and education benefits, health care and counseling are all exempt from sequestration, according to a Friday report from the White House that spells out the harm that awaits defense and non-defense programs if a way isn't found to avoid the across-the-board budget cuts." The Times says that "in a good news/bad news report to Congress, the White House said it has determined the entire Veterans Affairs Department budget is exempt from sequestration, a decision that answers nagging questions about whether VA might still be at risk for administrative cuts that would have forced layoffs, pay reductions and travel bans." Yet, "the bad news for veterans" is largely in outside programs that could be cut. It details some, including Arlington National Cemetery funding.
- 8. US Agent Orange Activist Brings Message Of Solidarity To Okinawa. Japan Times Efforts of Heather Bowser, the daughter of a Vietnam veteran who was exposed to Agent Orange, and her message to the residents of Okinawa Island, who "have recently been confronted with mounting evidence that their land used to be a major storage site for the toxic U.S. Defoliant." The Times says "Bowser's father campaigned to spread awareness" and she also did on Okinawa, where she told residents "to start organizing with each other to international Agent Orange communities. Demand full disclosure from the Japanese government as to the storage and use of Agent Orange in Okinawa. Now is not a time to stay silent."
- **9.** Anderson Iraq War Vet's Post-Traumatic Stress Tears Apart A Marriage, But There's A Happy Ending. Indianapolis Star An Indiana couple who suffered through the PTSD of the husband, Wes Carlile, an Iraq War veteran, and the effect on his family. The wife, Andrea, wrote "The War That Came Home," which she says is "a story of hope." She "wants the book, to which Wes contributed, to bring solace and inspiration to other fighting similar battles." Wes "sought help at the Marion VA Medical Center in late 2009," when "a psychologist said he was suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. He sought counseling but wasn't fully committed to it. They went to a VA weekend retreat for couples dealing with PTSD and that helped for a while." The Star details how the couple nearly divorced but fought to recover their marriage.

- 10.Mass. Program Helps Vets With Combat Stress. AP The Home Base Program in Boston, a partnership between Massachusetts General Hospital, the charitable foundation of the Boston Red Sox, and other agencies that "took root after the team visited vets at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Washington following its 2007 World Series win." The program "treats veterans of the Iraq and Afghanistan wars for post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injuries, conducts related research and provides counseling for veterans' family members." The program "is different from Department of Veterans Affairs programs because it also helps veterans with dishonorable discharges who are dealing with what experts call the 'invisible wounds of war.'" The AP notes that "a program affiliated with the Atlanta Braves has modeled itself after Home Base." The AP story was widely carried by news outlets.
- 11. Wounded Warriors Discuss Transitions To New Lives. American Forces Press

  Service The annual Warrior-Family Symposium in Washington this week that included personal accounts of recovery by four wounded warriors who suffered everything from PTSD and TBI to amputations and a suicide attempt. A caregiver for one also spoke of having "no handbook that says when you should pull back as a caregiver and give them more independence." She told John R. Campbell, deputy assistant secretary of defense for warrior care, "There are some really big holes that need to be filled either by the government or the private sector or both to give our families a chance." Campbell said he needed such input, and he told the symposium that the DoD's top priorities for group are "caregivers, National Guard and Reserve support, and sports for the wounded."
- 12.Ex-POW Devotes His Life To Service. Columbia (MO) Daily Tribune Bill Clark continues the story of John Clark, a six-year veteran of the Hanoi Hilton who endured "months and years of solitary confinement, beatings, continual interrogations, waterboarding, mind games, communicating with other prisoners using a tapping code, bad food, no way of knowing whether your family knew where you were and torture." Clark details some of the ways the veteran dealt with those six years and the ones that came after, and adds, "Since retirement, John has been involved with the American Ex-Prisoners of War" and also "works with the Veterans Administration hospital in Columbia, serving primarily in information outreach, helping explain veterans affairs and programs."
- **13.Want To Get A VA Loan?** <u>FOX News Business</u> "The VA loan remains one of the few mortgage options for borrowers who don't have down payments," and they "are somewhat easier to qualify for than conventional mortgages." FOX News Business explains the process, and notes that such loans are "available to more than 22 million veterans and active military members."
- **14.**More Veterans Off The Streets And Into Homes. KREX-TV Secretary Shinseki "set a national goal to eliminate all homelessness of veterans by 2015," and "Mesa County has been active in making sure this goal is reached." Even with winter approaching, "more veterans can say that they have a home," some because of "the housing choice voucher program," which has "reduced the number of homeless veterans on the streets in Mesa County." The report quotes Paul Sweeney, public relations officer for the VA Medical Center, who "said, 'The community should be

excited about this because it is not only a solution for our veterans, but it's a very successful solution."

- 15.VA Clinic In Ramsey Exceeding Expectations. Minneapolis Star Tribune "VA officials projected a patient base of 6,000 veterans" within three years for a new VA clinic in Ramsey, and "those figures now seem conservative." The clinic "was designed for veterans from the northwestern suburbs. But it is also attracting clients from California to North Carolina, from northwestern North Dakota to Superior, Wis., from Brainerd to Warroad." Moreover, "the 10-month-old community-based outreach clinic has drawn 59 patients from Minneapolis veterans who have chosen a 30-mile drive to the Ramsey site over the Minneapolis VA Medical Center, the largest VA hospital in the region." So far, the Ramsey clinic "has served veterans from 138 communities" and "11 states."
- **16.Disabled Vets Won't Need TxTags For Free Toll Program.** Austin (TX) American Statesman "Disabled veterans won't need TxTags to take advantage of a newly adopted program that waives fees for veterans on toll roads operated by the Texas Department of Transportation," according to the department. For the program that starts Jan. 1, "veterans with disabled veteran, Purple Heart or Medal of Honor specialty plates qualify for the free tolls." Equipment on the tollways will read the plates. The report also lists where veterans can drive free.
- **17.El Paso Veterans Court Expands To Accept Felony Charges.** KFOX-TV "The El Paso Veterans Court Program started in 2009, but first only incorporated misdemeanors." Now, however, "it has...been expanded to felonies, to include everything from drug possession to capital murder." In the program, "soldiers and veterans will go through a mental health assessment to see if the court can meet their needs. In some cases, instead of being convicted, a soldier will be given the treatment he or she needs." KFOX-TV points out that "the DA's office makes that determination."
- 18. Ceremony Honors State's Korean War Veterans. Charleston (WV) Gazette "U.S. Navy Cmdr. John O'Brien traveled from the Pentagon on Saturday to honor West Virginia's Korean War veterans with an array of the state's military personnel during a ceremony at the war memorial at the State Capitol Complex." Korean veteran Robert Wilmoth said, "I just couldn't believe it," when he read of the ceremony. "I'm happy they're finally acknowledging it was a war. We have truly been forgotten." The Gazette noted that O'Brien, who "travels the country with the Department of Defense's 60th Anniversary of the Korean War Commemoration Committe," works to make sure Korean vets are in fact remembered.
- **19.War Of 1812 Veteran Gets Military Honors.** AP Military honors were delivered Saturday for Richard Hill, an African-American veteran of the War of 1812 whose name and role were discovered by a researcher. Hill is "believed to have witnessed the British attack on Fort McHenry, which inspired Francis Scott Key to write 'The Star Spangled Banner.'" The government paid for a new headstone for Hill and is located "beside the graves of Portland's black American Revolutionary War veterans." The story was carried by at least five media outlets.

# 25. Today in History:

- <u>1716</u> <u>Jean</u> Thurel enlists in the <u>Touraine Regiment</u> at the age of 17, the first day of a military career that would span for over 90 years.
- <u>1775</u> <u>American Revolutionary War</u>: The <u>Invasion of Canada</u> begins with the <u>Siege of</u> Fort St. <u>Jean</u>.
- <u>1778</u> The <u>Treaty of Fort Pitt</u> is signed. It is the first formal treaty between the <u>United States</u> and a <u>Native American</u> tribe (the <u>Lenape</u> or Delaware Indians).
- <u>1787</u> The <u>United States Constitution</u> is signed in <u>Philadelphia</u>, <u>Pennsylvania</u>.
- <u>1809</u> Peace between <u>Sweden</u> and <u>Russia</u> in the <u>Finnish War</u>. The territory to become <u>Finland</u> is ceded to <u>Russia</u> by the <u>Treaty of Fredrikshamn</u>.
- <u>1814</u> <u>Francis Scott Key</u> finishes his poem "<u>Defence of Fort McHenry</u>", later to be the lyrics of "The Star-Spangled Banner".
- <u>1849</u> American <u>abolitionist Harriet Tubman</u> escapes from <u>slavery</u>.
- 1859 Joshua A. Norton declares himself "Emperor Norton I" of the United States.
- <u>1862</u> <u>American Civil War</u>: <u>George B. McClellan</u> halts the northward drive of <u>Robert E. Lee</u>'s <u>Confederate army</u> in the single-day <u>Battle of Antietam</u>, the bloodiest day in American history.
- 1862 American Civil War: The <u>Allegheny Arsenal</u> explosion results in the single largest civilian disaster during the war.
- <u>1894</u> The <u>Battle of Yalu River</u>, the largest naval engagement of the <u>First Sino-Japanese War</u>.

- 1900 Philippine-American War: Filipinos under <u>Juan Cailles defeat Americans</u> under <u>Colonel Benjamin F. Cheatham at Mabitac</u>.
- 1908 The Wright Flyer flown by Orville Wright, with Lieutenant Thomas Selfridge as passenger, crashes killing Selfridge. He becomes the first airplane fatality.
- <u>1916</u> <u>World War I</u>: <u>Manfred von Richthofen</u> ("The Red Baron"), a <u>flying ace</u> of the <u>German Luftstreitkräfte</u>, wins his first aerial combat near <u>Cambrai</u>, <u>France</u>.
- <u>1920</u> The <u>American Professional Football Association</u> (later renamed National Football League) is organized in <u>Canton, Ohio, United States</u>.
- <u>1924</u> The <u>Border Defence Corps</u> is established in the <u>Second Polish Republic</u> for the defence of the eastern border against armed <u>Soviet</u> raids and local bandits.
- <u>1928</u> The <u>Okeechobee Hurricane</u> strikes southeastern <u>Florida</u>, killing upwards of 2,500 people. It is the third deadliest natural disaster in <u>United States</u> history, behind the <u>Galveston Hurricane of 1900</u> and the <u>1906 San Francisco earthquake</u>.
- <u>1939</u> <u>World War II</u>: The <u>Soviet Union</u> joins <u>Nazi Germany</u>'s invasion of <u>Poland</u> during the <u>Polish Defensive War</u> of <u>1939</u>.
- 1939 World War II: A <u>German U-boat U 29</u> sinks the <u>British</u> aircraft carrier <u>HMS Courageous</u>.
- <u>1940</u> World War II: Following the <u>German</u> defeat in the <u>Battle of Britain</u>, <u>Hitler</u> postpones <u>Operation Sea Lion</u> indefinitely.
- <u>1941</u> World War II: A decree of the <u>Soviet</u> State Committee of Defense, restoring <u>Vsevobuch</u> in the face of the <u>Great Patriotic War</u>, is issued
- 1943 World War II: The Russian city of Bryansk is liberated from Nazis.
- <u>1944</u> World War II: <u>Allied</u> Airborne troops parachute into the <u>Netherlands</u> as the "Market" half of <u>Operation Market Garden</u>.
- <u>1948</u> The <u>Lehi</u> (also known as the Stern gang) assassinates Count <u>Folke Bernadotte</u>, who was appointed by the <u>UN</u> to mediate between the Arab nations and <u>Israel</u>.
- <u>1961</u> The world's first retractable-dome stadium, the <u>Civic Arena</u>, opens in <u>Pittsburgh</u>.
- <u>1976</u> The first <u>Space Shuttle</u>, <u>Enterprise</u>, is unveiled by <u>NASA</u>.
- 1978 The Camp David Accords are signed by Israel and Egypt.

The sponsor of the new bill, US Rep. Joe Heck (R-NV), "said last month that the measure would be constitutional because it narrows the scope by focusing on the fraud aspect." The American Civil Liberties Union says that while the new bill is a "marked improvement" over the Stolen Valor Act, it would "prefer Congress not take action."
  - 10. House Passes Student-Veteran Protection Bill. American Legion Its "longstanding"

campaign to improve the lot of veterans on campus has been bolstered" by the US House of Representatives' recent passage of the Improving Transparency of Education Opportunities for Veterans Act of 2012. As the "bill's name suggests, the measure mandates increased transparency and accountability at institutions offering post-secondary education to student veterans." The "legislation mandates extended counseling prior to school enrollment for veterans and establishes a means of lodging formal complaints by student veterans through the Department of Veterans Affairs."

- 11.HHS, VA Partner To Help States Expand Telehealth. Modern Healthcare The US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the US Veterans Affairs Department "said three states with the highest density of veterans will receive about \$300,000 each to implement telehealth systems or upgrade their telehealth capabilities." The "agencies said the Health Resources and Services Administration will administer a total of \$983,100 in grants to Alaska, Montana and Virginia to purchase telehealth equipment and develop electronic health records that are compatible with...VA's system." In the news release, VA Secretary Eric Shinseki said, "Working with partners like HHS, VA will continue to increase the reach of our services beyond our 152 major medical centers to ensure veterans receive the care they have earned and deserve." Healthcare IT News Shinseki and HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius "have announced a joint effort to expand care delivery to veterans living in rural areas." In the aformentioned news release, Shinseki called the effort an "outstanding example of a partnership that expands access to care and improves quality of life for rural veterans."
- 12. Wounded Veterans' Caregivers A Priority. Stars And Stripes "A top defense official is making support for caregivers of wounded veterans a priority this year, calling for collaboration between the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Department of Defense and the private sector." The comments were made by Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense John R. Campbell, who spoke at the 2012 Warrior-Family Symposium on Thursday. Stars And Stripes adds, "Last year, the Department of Veterans Affairs began providing stipends and new support programs to qualified spouses and parents of wounded troops, as part of a larger effort to assist those caregivers. At the conference on Thursday, VA Secretary Eric Shinseki said nearly 6,000 caregivers have signed up for those programs."

Congressional offices to ask their legislators to Finish Strong for Veterans. Building on critical issues remaining, they discussed several bills still in play calling on Congress to act before the end of the current term. Some of VFW outstanding issues included protections for VA and Dodd from across-the-board cuts, education and job creation for veterans, improved care for women veterans and stopping any changes to military healthcare and retirement benefits. Stolen Valor Act Update: The Stolen Valor Act of 2012 overwhelmingly passed the House on Thursday by a vote of 410-3. The legislation closes a specific loophole that the U.S. Supreme Court identified when it overturned the VFW-supported Stolen Valor Act of 2005 in June due to First Amendment freedom of speech protections. The new version would make it illegal for a person to benefit from lying about being awarded military medals, awards and badges, to include the military's top valor awards, as well as the Purple Heart, and combat badges, medals and ribbons. Punishments could include up to one year in prison and a \$10,000 fine. Sponsored by Rep. Joe Heck (R-Nev.), a Navy veteran, the House-passed bill is similar to a measure introduced by Sen. Scott Brown (R-Mass.), a colonel in the Army National Guard. Another bill in the Senate, sponsored by Navy Cross recipient Sen. Jim Webb (D-Va.), would also make it a federal crime to benefit from the lie.

Sequestration Update: The Office of Management and Budget released its long-awaited report today on the pending effects of sequestration on government programs, as required by the Sequestration Transparency Act. The VFW is thankful to see that veterans' programs would not be affected by sequestration, since there had been conflicting information about whether VA administrative accounts might be cut. Personnel accounts related to pay and retirement in the Department of Defense are also untouched. The VFW, however, remains very concerned that 9.4% funding reductions to Quality of Life accounts---like \$3.2 billion less for the Defense Health Program and \$121 million less for Military Family Housing Operations and Maintenance---would be very detrimental to the morale of a military that is still at war.

**Veterans' Education Bill Passes House**: Late Tuesday the House passed VFW-supported legislation designed to improve protections for student veterans using Post 9/11 GI Bill benefits. H.R. 4057 was also amended to include several other provisions including safe housing for homeless veterans, an Open Air Burn Pit exposure registry within VA and a change to ensure that States consider military training for professional licenses in several technical fields. # Sequestration Might Be Manageable, Experts Say

(Defense News) Devastating. Catastrophe. Disaster. That is how Pentagon officials, lawmakers and industry executives have described \$500 billion in automatic military budget cuts set to kick in Jan. 2 unless Congress comes up with a solution. Yet amid all the dramatic rhetoric about those cuts, several nonpartisan Washington think tanks have produced analyses that suggest the process known as sequestration might be manageable.

White House Releases Sequestration Report: If Congress does not reach a deficitreduction deal before January, the Pentagon will have to cut its base budget by \$54.7 billion in Fiscal 2013 under sequestration, according to the White House's newly released report to Congress. That's a 9.4 percent reduction to each of the services' discretionary accounts except for personnel accounts, which are exempt—states the document, issued on Sept. 14 by the White House budget office. Congress mandated the report under the Sequestration Transparency Act of 2012 in order to understand sequestration's impact on defense accounts and federal non-defense programs in Fiscal 2013. Among the Air Force's cuts would be a \$5.2 billion reduction to operations and maintenance activities; \$2.7 billion hit to research, development, test, and evaluation work; \$2 billion reduction in aircraft procurement; and \$167 million less for military construction, according to the report. "While the Department of Defense would be able to shift funds to ensure warfighting and critical military readiness capabilities were not degraded, sequestration would result in a reduction in readiness of many non-deployed units, delays in investments in new equipment and facilities, cutbacks in equipment repairs, declines in military research and development efforts, and reductions in base services for military families," states the report.
