- Pentagon outlines ideas for hybrid retirement system. Amid attempts to reduce military personnel spending, the Pentagon on Thursday presented its official thinking on the politically touchy issue of how remake the military retirement system.
- 2. Commissaries to be run as a business, not a benefit. Behind the plan to slash taxpayer support of commissaries is a concept Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel and his senior advisors have embraced that base grocery stores should operate as a business and not a benefit.

- 1658 Treaty of Roskilde: After a devastating defeat in the Northern Wars
 (1655–1661), Frederick III, the King of Denmark-Norway is forced to give up
 nearly half his territory to Sweden to save the rest.
- <u>1702</u> <u>Anne Stuart</u>, sister of <u>Mary II</u>, becomes <u>Queen regnant</u> of <u>England</u>, Scotland, and Ireland.
- <u>1722</u> The <u>Safavid Empire</u> of <u>Iran</u> is defeated by an army from <u>Afghanistan</u> at The Battle of Gulnabad, pushing Iran into anarchy.

- 1862 American Civil War: The iron-clad <u>CSS Virginia</u> (formerly <u>USS Merrimack</u>) is launched at <u>Hampton Roads</u>, <u>Virginia</u>.

- 1920 The <u>Arab Kingdom of Syria</u>, the first modern <u>Arab</u> state to come into existence, is established.
- <u>1921</u> <u>Spanish Premier Eduardo Dato Iradier</u> is assassinated while exiting the <u>parliament</u> building in <u>Madrid</u>.
- 1924 The <u>Castle Gate mine disaster</u> kills 172 coal miners near <u>Castle Gate</u>, <u>Utah</u>.
