- <u>1743</u> <u>War of the Austrian Succession</u>: <u>Battle of Dettingen</u>: On the battlefield in Bavaria, <u>George II</u> personally leads troops into battle. The last time that a British monarch would command troops in the field.
- <u>1759</u> General <u>James Wolfe</u> begins the siege of <u>Quebec</u>.
- <u>1806</u> British forces take <u>Buenos Aires</u> during the first <u>British invasions of the</u> <u>Río de la Plata</u>.
- <u>1895</u> The inaugural run of the <u>Baltimore and Ohio Railroad</u>'s <u>Royal Blue</u> from <u>Washington, D.C.</u>, to <u>New York</u>, <u>New York</u>, the first U.S. passenger train to use <u>electric locomotives</u>.

- <u>1927</u> <u>Prime Minister of Japan Tanaka Giichi</u> leads a conference to discuss <u>Japan</u>'s plans for <u>China</u>; later, a document detailing these plans, the "<u>Tanaka</u> <u>Memorial</u>" is leaked, although it is now considered a forgery.
- <u>1941</u> Romanian governmental forces, allies of Nazi Germany, launch <u>one of</u> <u>the most violent pogroms</u> in Jewish history in the city of <u>laşi</u>, (<u>Romania</u>), resulting in the murder of at least 13,266 Jews.
- 1941 German troops capture the city of <u>Białystok</u> during <u>Operation Barbarossa</u>.
- <u>1946</u> In the <u>Canadian Citizenship Act</u>, the <u>Parliament of Canada</u> establishes the definition of Canadian citizenship.
- <u>1950</u> The <u>United States</u> decides to send troops to fight in the <u>Korean War</u>.
- <u>1954</u> The world's first <u>nuclear power station</u> opens in <u>Obninsk</u>, near <u>Moscow</u>.
- 1954 The <u>1954 FIFA World Cup</u> quarterfinal match between <u>Hungary</u> and <u>Brazil</u>, highly anticipated to be exciting, instead <u>turns violent</u>, with three players ejected and further fighting continuing after the game.
- <u>1957</u> <u>Hurricane Audrey</u> makes landfall near the <u>Texas</u>-<u>Louisiana</u> border, killing over 400 people, mainly in and around <u>Cameron, Louisiana</u>.
- <u>1971</u> After only three years in business, rock promoter <u>Bill Graham</u> closes the <u>Fillmore East</u> in New York, New York, the "Church of Rock and Roll".
- <u>1973</u> The <u>President of Uruguay Juan María Bordaberry</u> dissolves Parliament and establishes a dictatorship.
- <u>1974</u> <u>U.S.</u> president <u>Richard Nixon</u> visits the <u>Soviet Union</u>.
- <u>1976</u> <u>Air France Flight 139</u> (<u>Tel Aviv-Athens-Paris</u>) is hijacked en route to Paris by the <u>PLO</u> and redirected to <u>Entebbe</u>, <u>Uganda</u>.
- <u>1977</u> <u>France</u> grants independence to <u>Djibouti</u>.
- <u>1980</u> <u>Italian Aerolinee Itavia Flight 870</u> mysteriously explodes in mid air while in route from <u>Bologna</u> to <u>Palermo</u>, killing all 81 on board. Also known in Italy as the <u>Ustica disaster</u>
- <u>1981</u> The <u>Central Committee of the Communist Party of China</u> issues its "Resolution on Certain Questions in the History of Our Party Since the Founding of the People's Republic of China", laying the blame for the <u>Cultural Revolution</u> on <u>Mao Zedong</u>.
- <u>1982</u> <u>Space Shuttle Columbia</u> launched from the <u>Kennedy Space Center</u> on the final research and development flight mission, <u>STS-4</u>.
- <u>1985</u> The <u>U.S. Route 66</u> is closed
- <u>1991</u> <u>Slovenia</u>, after declaring independence two days before is invaded by <u>Yugoslav</u> troops, tanks, and aircraft starting the <u>Ten-Day War</u>.
- <u>2007</u> <u>Tony Blair</u> British Prime Minister since 2nd May 1997, resigns
- <u>2007</u> The <u>Brazilian Military Police</u> invades the <u>favelas</u> of <u>Complexo do Alemão</u> in an episode which is remembered as the <u>Complexo do Alemão massacre</u>.
- <u>2008</u> In a <u>highly-scrutizined election</u> <u>President of Zimbabwe Robert Mugabe</u> is re-elected in a landslide after his opponent <u>Morgan Tsvangirai</u> had withdrawn a week earlier, citing violence against <u>his party</u>'s supporters.
