### **15.** Today in History:

- <u>1779</u> <u>American Revolutionary War</u>: <u>light infantry</u> of the <u>Continental Army</u> seize a fortified <u>British Army</u> position in a midnight bayonet attack at the <u>Battle of Stony</u> Point.
- <u>1790</u> The <u>District of Columbia</u> is established as the capital of the United States after signature of the <u>Residence Act</u>.
- <u>1809</u> The city of <u>La Paz</u>, in what is today <u>Bolivia</u>, declares its independence from the <u>Spanish Crown</u> during the <u>La Paz revolution</u> and forms the Junta Tuitiva, the first independent government in Spanish America, led by <u>Pedro</u> <u>Domingo Murillo</u>.
- 1861 American Civil War: at the order of President Abraham Lincoln, Union troops begin a 25 mile march into Virginia for what will become the First Battle of Bull Run, the first major land battle of the war.
- <u>1862</u> American Civil War: <u>David Farragut</u> is promoted to <u>rear admiral</u>, becoming the first officer in <u>United States Navy</u> to hold an admiral rank.
- 1910 John Robertson Duigan makes the first flight of the <u>Duigan pusher</u> biplane, the first aircraft built in Australia.
- <u>1915</u> <u>Henry James</u> becomes a British citizen, to highlight his commitment to England during the first World War.
- 1915 First Order of the Arrow ceremony takes places and the Order of the Arrow is founded.
- 1927 Augusto César Sandino leads a raid on U.S. Marines and Nicaraguan Guardia Nacional that had been sent to apprehend him in the village of Ocotal, but is repulsed by one of the first dive-bombing attacks in history.

- 1935 The world's first parking meter is installed in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 1941 Joe DiMaggio hits safely for the 56th consecutive game, a streak that still stands as a MLB record.
- 1942 Holocaust: Vel' d'Hiv Roundup (Rafle du Vel' d'Hiv): the government of Vichy France orders the mass arrest of 13,152 Jews who are held at the Winter Velodrome in Paris before deportation to Auschwitz.
- <u>1945</u> <u>World War II</u>: The <u>heavy cruiser USS *Indianapolis*</u> leaves San Francisco with parts for the atomic bomb "<u>Little Boy</u>" bound for <u>Tinian Island</u>.
- 1945 <u>Manhattan Project</u>: the <u>Atomic Age</u> begins when the <u>United States</u> successfully detonates a <u>plutonium</u>-based test <u>nuclear weapon</u> near Alamogordo, New Mexico.
- 1948 Following token resistance, the city of <u>Nazareth</u>, revered by Christians as the hometown of <u>Jesus</u>, capitulates to <u>Israeli</u> troops during <u>Operation Dekel</u> in the 1948 Arab–Israeli War.
- 1948 The storming of the cockpit of the <u>Miss Macao</u> passenger seaplane, operated by a subsidiary of the <u>Cathay Pacific</u> Airways, marks the first <u>aircraft</u> hijacking of a commercial plane.
- 1950 Chaplain–Medic massacre: American POWs were massacred by North Korean Army.
- 1951 <u>The Catcher in the Rye</u> by <u>J. D. Salinger</u> is published for the first time by Little, Brown and Company.
- 1956 Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus closes its very last "Big Tent" show in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, due to changing economics all subsequent circus shows will be held in arenas.
- <u>1960</u> <u>USS George Washington</u> a modified <u>Skipjack class submarine</u> successfully test fires the first <u>ballistic missile</u> while submerged.
- <u>1965</u> The <u>Mont Blanc Tunnel</u> linking <u>France</u> and <u>Italy</u> opens.
- <u>1969 Apollo program</u>: <u>Apollo 11</u>, the first <u>manned space mission</u> to land on the Moon, is launched from the Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral, Florida.
- 1973 Watergate scandal: former White House aide Alexander Butterfield informs the United States Senate that President Richard Nixon had secretly recorded potentially incriminating conversations.
- 1979 <u>Iraqi President Ahmed Hassan al-Bakr</u> resigns and is replaced by <u>Saddam Hussein</u>.
- 1981 Mahathir Mohamad becomes Malaysia's 4th Prime Minister; his 22 years in office, ending with retirement on 31 October 2003, made him Asia's longest-serving political leader.
- 1990 The <u>Parliament of the Ukrainian SSR</u> <u>declares state sovereignty</u> over the territory of the <u>Ukrainian SSR</u>.
- 1993 The Slackware operating system is first released.
- 1994 Comet Shoemaker–Levy 9 collides with <u>Jupiter</u>. Impacts continue until July 22.
- 1999 John F. Kennedy, Jr., piloting a <u>Piper Saratoga</u> aircraft, dies when his
  plane crashes into the <u>Atlantic Ocean</u> off the coast of <u>Martha's Vineyard</u>. His wife
  <u>Carolyn Bessette-Kennedy</u> and sister-in-law <u>Lauren Bessette</u> are also killed.

- 2004 Millennium Park, considered Chicago, Illinois's first and most ambitious early 21st century architectural project, is opened to the public by Mayor Richard M. Daley.
- 2007 An <u>earthquake</u> of magnitude 6.8 and 6.6 aftershock occurs off the <u>Niigata</u> coast of <u>Japan</u> killing eight people, injuring at least 800 and damaging a nuclear power plant.
- 2008 Sixteen infants in <u>Gansu Province</u>, China, who had been fed on <u>tainted</u> milk powder, are diagnosed with <u>kidney stones</u>; in total an estimated 300,000 infants are affected.
