- 1. <u>Photo gallery: A Christmas feast for US personnel in Bahrain</u>. U.S. personnel stationed in Bahrain were joined for a special meal this Christmas by sailors and Marines from the aircraft carrier USS Harry S. Truman.
- 2. <u>Women pilots of WWII will get grand recognition in Rose Parade</u>. In the midst of World War II, with legions of male pilots overseas, the 1,102 young women comprising the Women Airforce Service Pilots flew more than 60 million miles domestically, test-flew repaired military aircraft and ferried non-flying male military officers around the country.
- **3.** <u>Congress is skeptical of new Pentagon spy agency</u>. Congress is giving only halfhearted support to a Pentagon effort to broaden military espionage operations beyond war zones.

- <u>1825</u> Advocates of <u>liberalism</u> in <u>Russia</u> rise up against <u>Czar Nicholas I</u> and are put down in the <u>Decembrist revolt</u> in <u>Saint Petersburg</u>.
- <u>1846</u> Trapped in snow in the <u>Sierra Nevadas</u> and without food, members of the <u>Donner Party</u> resort to <u>cannibalism</u>.
- <u>1861</u> <u>American Civil War</u>: The <u>Trent Affair</u>: <u>Confederate</u> diplomatic envoys <u>James M. Mason</u> and <u>John Slidell</u> are freed by the <u>United States</u> government, thus heading off a possible war between the United States and United Kingdom.
- <u>1862</u> American Civil War: The <u>Battle of Chickasaw Bayou</u> begins.
- 1862 Four nuns serving as volunteer <u>nurses</u> on board <u>USS *Red Rover*</u> are the first female nurses on a <u>U.S. Navy hospital ship</u>.

- <u>1900</u> A relief crew arrives at the <u>lighthouse</u> on the <u>Flannan Isles</u> of <u>Scotland</u>, UK, only to find the previous crew has disappeared without a trace.
- <u>1919</u> <u>Babe Ruth</u> of the <u>Boston Red Sox</u> is sold to the <u>New York Yankees</u> by owner <u>Harry Frazee</u>.
- <u>1941</u> <u>U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt</u> signs a bill establishing the fourth Thursday in November as <u>Thanksgiving Day</u> in the United States.
- <u>1943</u> World War II: German warship <u>Scharnhorst</u> is sunk off of <u>Norway</u>'s <u>North</u> <u>Cape</u> after a <u>battle against major Royal Navy forces</u>.
- <u>1944</u> World War II: <u>George S. Patton's Third Army breaks the encirclement</u> of surrounded U.S. forces at <u>Bastogne</u>, <u>Belgium</u>.
- <u>1948</u> Cardinal <u>József Mindszenty</u> is arrested in <u>Hungary</u> and accused of <u>treason</u> and conspiracy.
- <u>1963 The Beatles'</u> "<u>I Want to Hold Your Hand</u>" and "<u>I Saw Her Standing There</u>" are released in the United States, marking the beginning of Beatle-mania on an international level.
- <u>1966</u> The first <u>Kwanzaa</u> is celebrated by <u>Maulana Karenga</u>, the chair of <u>Black</u> <u>Studies</u> at <u>California State University</u>, <u>Long Beach</u>.
- <u>1972</u> <u>Vietnam War</u>: As part of <u>Operation Linebacker II</u>, 120 American <u>B-52</u> <u>Stratofortress</u> bombers attacked <u>Hanoi</u>, including 78 launched from <u>Andersen Air</u> <u>Force Base</u> in <u>Guam</u>, the largest single combat launch in <u>Strategic Air Command</u> history.
- <u>1976</u> The <u>Communist Party of Nepal (Marxist–Leninist)</u> is founded.
- <u>1982</u> <u>Time's Man of the Year</u> is for the first time a non-human, the <u>personal</u> <u>computer</u>.

- <u>1991</u> The <u>Supreme Soviet of the Soviet Union</u> meets and formally dissolves the <u>Soviet Union</u>.
- <u>1994</u> Four <u>Armed Islamic Group hijackers</u> seize control of <u>Air France Flight</u> <u>8969</u>. When the plane lands at <u>Marseille</u>, a <u>French Gendarmerie</u> assault team boards the aircraft and kills the hijackers.
- <u>1996</u> Six-year-old beauty queen <u>JonBenét Ramsey</u> is found beaten and strangled in the basement of her family's home in <u>Boulder, Colorado</u>.
- 1996 Start of the largest strike in South Korean history.
- <u>1997</u> The <u>Soufrière Hills</u> volcano on the island of <u>Montserrat</u> explodes, creating a small <u>tsunami</u> offshore.
- <u>1998</u> <u>Iraq</u> announces its intention to fire upon U.S. and British warplanes that patrol the northern and southern <u>no-fly zones</u>.
- <u>1999</u> The storm <u>Lothar</u> sweeps across Central Europe, killing 137 and causing US\$1.3 billion in damage.
- <u>2003</u> A <u>magnitude 6.6 earthquake</u> devastates southeast <u>Iranian</u> city of <u>Bam</u>, killing tens of thousands and destroying the citadel of <u>Arg-é Bam</u>.
- <u>2004</u> A <u>9.3 magnitude earthquake</u> creates a <u>tsunami</u> causing devastation in <u>Sri</u> <u>Lanka</u>, <u>India</u>, <u>Indonesia</u>, <u>Thailand</u>, <u>Malaysia</u>, the <u>Maldives</u> and many other areas around the rim of the <u>Indian Ocean</u>, killing over 230,000.
- 2004 <u>Orange Revolution</u>: The final <u>run-off election</u> in Ukraine is held under heavy international scrutiny.
- <u>2006</u> An <u>oil pipeline</u> in <u>Lagos</u>, <u>Nigeria</u> <u>explodes</u>, killing at least 260.
