[New White House Plan Would Cut \\$100 Billion From Defense](#)

(DefenseNews.com) - The White House is preparing to submit a fiscal 2014 federal budget that would partially offset across-the-board sequestration cuts by reducing the Pentagon budget by \$100 billion, but not until later this decade, according to a senior defense official and budget documents..

(Wall Street Journal) - The White House is working to shift control of the Central Intelligence Agency's lethal drone program to the military, U.S. officials say, a move that redefines the widely contested campaign that targets suspected terrorists.

Marrying Ideas for the Total Force: The Quadrennial Defense Review will take a "holistic approach" to addressing the ongoing debate over the proper Total Force mix, said [Maj. Gen. Steven Kwast](#), the Air Force's QDR director, on Wednesday. This will include marrying the recommendations of the Air Force's [Total Force Task Force](#) and the independent National Commission on the Structure of the Air Force that [Congress established](#), said Kwast during a talk sponsored by AFA's Mitchell Institute for Airpower Studies in Arlington, Va., on March 20. The balance between the Active Duty component and the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve is "very, very complex," and it's important that the Air Force avoids a "stovepipe" fix and instead considers solutions that "can solve multiple problems," he said. "The people part of this... is the most important part," said Kwast. The Total Force issue was in the spotlight last year when [Congress rejected](#) the Air Force's original Fiscal 2013 proposal to cut 5,100 Air Guard positions, 3,900 Active Duty billets, and 900 Air Force Reservists, along with corresponding aircraft reductions. Instead, [lawmakers accepted](#) force structure changes reduced in scope and mandated the commission for a deeper look at the best Total Force makeup.

Bring a Knife: The Air Force is well aware that the Quadrennial Defense Review could devolve into a budgetary knife fight among the services, [Maj. Gen. Steven Kwast](#), the Air Force's QDR director, told the *Daily Report* on Wednesday. Kwast said he heard former Air Force Secretary Whit Peters' comments last month at AFA's Air Warfare Symposium in Orlando, Fla., that the "QDR is supposed to be a strategic and policy planning event. It is, in fact, a huge budget fight." Kwast, in response, said, "You hope it won't come down to that. . . . We want to address this collegially, and with an open mind." However, if the worst comes to pass, and the budget pressures are too extreme to permit a calm reassessment of national strategy as constrained by a tight budget, "I have a knife in my back pocket," said Kwast. "But I hope I won't have to use it. We're not so naïve to think that's not a possibility. But what's the point of this exercise unless you're willing to take an innovative approach?" A budget brawl "won't get us where we need to go," he added. He spoke to the *Daily Report* after his March 20 address to AFA's Mitchell Institute for Airpower Studies in Arlington, Va.

You Are What You Eat: The Air Force has launched a pilot campaign called "Better Foods, Better Bodies" to motivate airmen and their families to eat healthier. "We want airmen and their families to live long, healthy lives and we know a lot of that depends on what they put into their bodies," said Mary Balch of the Air Force Medical Operations Agency, who is directing the campaign, in a [March 19 release](#). The Air Force surgeon general's office and AFMOA's health promotion office are leading this effort, which is under way at three pilot locations before its potential rollout across the entire Air Force: JB Andrews, Md.; JBSA-Lackland, Tex.; and JB Langley-Eustis, Va. From online tools and resources, like recipes, to posters and coupons, the campaign seeks to educate airmen and their families in making smarter food choices, such as eating more fruits and vegetables, states the release.

Propeller Issue Led to Predator Crash: A propeller malfunction on an MQ-1 Predator remotely piloted aircraft, coupled with operator error, led to the platform's crash last October in Afghanistan, announced Air Combat Command officials. The Predator was about 10 hours into a surveillance mission out of Jalalabad Air Base on Oct. 26, 2012, when it developed a problem with its variable pitch propeller, according to ACC's March 19 [release](#) that cites the newly released findings of the command's abbreviated accident investigation board report (AIB [report](#); caution, large-sized file.)

Air Force Subsumes Responsive Space Office: The Pentagon's Operationally Responsive Space office now falls under the oversight of the Space and Missile Systems Center at Los Angeles AFB, Calif., announced center officials. "We are excited to integrate the ORS office into our team as we continue to deliver capability to our warfighters at the speed of need," said [Lt. Gen. Ellen Pawlikowski](#), SMC commander, during an assumption-of-command ceremony earlier this month for the ORS office's new director, Col. John Anttonen, according to SMC's March 19 [release](#). "This realignment will benefit all of our mission areas by bringing ORS principles and capabilities to bear across the portfolio while providing the ORS office with closer access to the incredible depth and expertise of the [SMC] directorates," said Pawlikowski. The joint office, located at Kirtland AFB, N.M., formerly resided organizationally under the Office of the Secretary of Defense, but the Fiscal 2013 defense authorization act stipulated that the office shift under SMC, the Air Force's space acquisition arm. The ORS office is charged with rapidly developing responsive space capabilities, such as small-sized communications or imagery satellites, that support combatant commanders. First Sergeant Academy Updates Curriculum: The Air Force First Sergeant Academy at Maxwell AFB, Ala., has transformed its course curriculum from a traditional education experience to one combining facilitated distance learning—akin to online instruction—and in-residence classroom time, according to a base release. The academy's course, which was formerly three weeks of in-residence instruction at Maxwell, now comprises four weeks of distance learning followed by two weeks at the academy, states Maxwell's March 20 release. Pilot error one cause of 2012 Predator crash

Study: MRI could diagnose Gulf War Illness

Veterans of the 1991 Persian Gulf War suffering from chronic pain and fatigue have brain damage to their white matter, the connective nerve fibers that transmit electrical impulses among the brain's gray matter, a Georgetown University Medical Center study finds.

Using advanced scans called diffusion tensor imaging, researchers discovered that the brains of 31 veterans who served in the Gulf War had significant changes to the axon bundles — the white matter — in the parts of the brain that process pain and fatigue. [[Read More](#)]
