The 173rd Airborne Brigade, the first U.S. combat unit in the Vietnam War, lost 48 paratroopers during intense fighting on Nov. 8, 1965. Those soldiers and others were remembered Saturday as hundreds gathered at the National Infantry Museum and Soldier Center.

17. Today in History:

- <u>1584</u> <u>Sir Walter Raleigh</u> is granted a patent to colonize <u>Virginia</u>.
- <u>1634</u> The first settlers arrive in <u>Maryland</u>.
- <u>1655</u> <u>Saturn</u>'s largest moon, <u>Titan</u>, is discovered by <u>Christiaan Huygens</u>.
- <u>1802</u> The <u>Treaty of Amiens</u> is signed as a "Definitive Treaty of Peace" between France and the <u>United Kingdom</u>.
- <u>1807</u> The <u>Slave Trade Act</u> becomes law, abolishing the <u>slave trade</u> in the <u>British Empire</u>.
- 1807 The <u>Swansea and Mumbles Railway</u>, then known as the Oystermouth Railway, becomes the first passenger carrying railway in the world.
- <u>1811</u> <u>Percy Bysshe Shelley</u> is expelled from the <u>University of Oxford</u> for publishing the pamphlet <u>The Necessity of Atheism</u>.
- <u>1821</u> (Julian Calendar) Traditional date of the start of the <u>Greek War of</u> <u>Independence</u>. The war had actually began since <u>23 February</u> 1821. The date was chosen in the early years of the Greek state so that it falls on the day of the <u>Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary</u>, strengthening the ties between the Greek Orthodox Church and the newly-found state.
- <u>1865</u> <u>American Civil War</u>: In <u>Virginia</u>, <u>Confederate</u> forces temporarily capture <u>Fort Stedman</u> from the <u>Union</u>.
- <u>1894</u> <u>Coxey's Army</u>, the first significant <u>American</u> protest march, departs <u>Massillon, Ohio</u> for <u>Washington D.C.</u>
- <u>1911</u> In <u>New York City</u>, the <u>Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire</u> kills 146 garment workers.
- <u>1917</u> The <u>Georgian Orthodox Church</u> restores its <u>autocephaly</u> abolished by <u>Imperial Russia</u> in 1811.
- <u>1918</u> The <u>Belarusian People's Republic</u> is established.
- <u>1924</u> On the anniversary of <u>Greek Independence</u>, <u>Alexandros Papanastasiou</u> proclaims the <u>Second Hellenic Republic</u>.
- <u>1931</u> The <u>Scottsboro Boys</u> are arrested in <u>Alabama</u> and charged with <u>rape</u>.
- <u>1941</u> The <u>Kingdom of Yugoslavia</u> joins the <u>Axis powers</u> with the signing of the <u>Tripartite Pact</u>.
- <u>1947</u> An <u>explosion in a coal mine</u> in <u>Centralia</u>, <u>Illinois</u> kills 111.
- <u>1948</u> The first successful <u>tornado</u> <u>forecast</u> predicts that <u>a tornado will strike</u> <u>Tinker Air Force Base</u>, <u>Oklahoma</u>.
- <u>1949</u> The extensive deportation campaign known as <u>March deportation</u> is conducted in <u>Estonia</u>, <u>Latvia</u> and <u>Lithuania</u> to force <u>collectivisation</u> by way of <u>terror</u>. The <u>Soviet</u> authorities deport more than 92,000 people from the <u>Baltics</u> to remote areas of the <u>Soviet Union</u>.
- <u>1957</u> <u>United States Customs</u> seizes copies of <u>Allen Ginsberg</u>'s poem "<u>Howl</u>" on the grounds of obscenity.
- 1957 The European Economic Community is established (<u>West Germany</u>, France, <u>Italy</u>, <u>Belgium</u>, <u>Netherlands</u>, <u>Luxembourg</u>).
- <u>1958</u> <u>Canada</u>'s <u>Avro Arrow</u> makes its first flight.
- <u>1965</u> <u>Civil rights</u> activists led by <u>Martin Luther King, Jr.</u> successfully complete their 4-day 50-mile march from <u>Selma</u> to the capitol in <u>Montgomery, Alabama</u>.

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- <u>1969</u> During their honeymoon, <u>John Lennon</u> and <u>Yoko Ono</u> hold their first <u>Bed-</u> <u>In for Peace</u> at the Amsterdam Hilton Hotel (until March 31).
- <u>1971</u> <u>Bangladesh Liberation War</u>: Beginning of <u>Operation Searchlight</u> by the <u>Pakistani Armed Forces</u> against <u>East Pakistani</u> civilians.
- 1971 The <u>Army of the Republic of Vietnam abandon an attempt</u> to cut off the <u>Ho Chi Minh trail</u> in <u>Laos</u>.
- <u>1975 Faisal of Saudi Arabia</u> is shot and killed by a <u>mentally ill</u> nephew.
- <u>1979</u> The first fully functional <u>space shuttle</u> orbiter, <u>Columbia</u>, is delivered to the <u>John F. Kennedy Space Center</u> to be prepared for its first launch.
- <u>1988</u> The <u>Candle demonstration</u> in <u>Bratislava</u> is the first mass demonstration of the 1980s against the communist regime in <u>Czechoslovakia</u>.
- <u>1990</u> The <u>Happy Land fire</u> was an arson fire that kills 87 people trapped inside an illegal nightclub in the <u>New York City borough</u> of <u>The Bronx</u>.
- <u>1992</u> <u>Pakistan national cricket team</u> won the <u>1992 Cricket World Cup</u> first time in the history of cricket, <u>Final</u> was played at <u>Melbourne Cricket Ground</u>.
- <u>1992</u> <u>Cosmonaut Sergei Krikalev</u> returns to <u>Earth</u> after a 10-month stay aboard the <u>Mir space station</u>.
- <u>1995</u> <u>WikiWikiWeb</u>, the world's first wiki, and part of the <u>Portland Pattern</u> <u>Repository</u>, is made public by <u>Ward Cunningham</u>.
- <u>1996</u> An <u>81-day-long standoff</u> between the anti-government group <u>Montana</u> <u>Freemen</u> and law enforcement near <u>Jordan, Montana</u>, begins.
- 1996 The European Union's Veterinarian Committee bans the export of British beef and its by-products as a result of mad cow disease (Bovine spongiform encephalopathy).
- <u>2006</u> <u>Capitol Hill massacre</u>: A gunman kills six people before taking his own life at a party in Seattle's <u>Capitol Hill</u> neighborhood.
- 2006 Protesters demanding a new election in <u>Belarus</u>, following the rigged <u>Belarusian presidential election</u>, 2006, clash with riot police. Opposition leader <u>Aleksander Kozulin</u> is among several protesters arrested.
