- <u>Top military images for 2012</u>. The Military Photographer of the Year competition was judged last week at the Defense Information School at Fort Meade, Md. These images were selected as this year's best from 11 categories.
- 2. <u>Vietnam vets finally get their day, as Ohio holds first holiday to honor war's soldiers</u>. Four decades after American troops left Vietnam, Ohio is officially welcoming them home. The state's first Vietnam Veterans Day is set for Saturday, but all the commemorative events will happen before then to avoid conflicts with Easter weekend.
- **3.** <u>Marine's mother leads effort to send supplies to overseas platoon</u>. Thousands of miles from home and risking their lives to keep this country safe, the pressure borne on the backs of military servicemen and women can be daunting. But nothing can lift their spirits quite like receiving letters and care packages from home.
- 4. World War II submariners remember their days at sea. Jack Hoenes and his comrades who served on submarines during World War II know the number. Fifty-two. That is how many submarines sunk or were missing during the war. For Hoenes, the number includes a submarine that could have taken his life.

- <u>1979</u> <u>Anwar al-Sadat</u>, <u>Menachem Begin</u> and <u>Jimmy Carter</u> sign the <u>Israel-</u> <u>Egypt Peace Treaty</u> in <u>Washington</u>, D.C.
- <u>1982</u> A groundbreaking ceremony for the <u>Vietnam Veterans Memorial</u> is held in Washington, D.C..
- <u>1991</u> <u>Argentina</u>, <u>Brazil</u>, <u>Uruguay</u> and <u>Paraguay</u> sign the <u>Treaty of Asunción</u>, establishing <u>Mercosur</u>, the South Common Market.
- 1991 Five South Korean boys, nicknamed the <u>Frog Boys</u>, disappear while hunting for frogs and are murdered in a case that remains unsolved.
- <u>1995</u> The <u>Schengen Treaty</u> comes into effect.
- <u>1997</u> Thirty-nine bodies are found in the <u>Heaven's Gate cult suicides</u>.
- <u>1998</u> <u>Oued Bouaicha massacre</u> in <u>Algeria</u>: 52 people are killed with axes and knives, 32 of them babies under the age of 2.
- <u>1999</u> The "<u>Melissa worm</u>" infects <u>Microsoft</u> word processing and e-mail systems around the world.
- 1999 A jury in <u>Michigan</u> finds Dr. <u>Jack Kevorkian</u> guilty of second-degree <u>murder</u> for administering a lethal injection to a terminally ill man.
- <u>2005</u> The <u>Taiwanese</u> government calls on 1 million <u>Taiwanese</u> to demonstrate in <u>Taipei</u>, in opposition to the <u>Anti-Secession Law of the People's Republic of</u> <u>China</u>. Around 200,000 to 300,000 attend the demonstration.
