The Air Force released Cyber Vision 2025, a vision document that provides a blueprint for where the Air Force should focus its science and technology activities in the cyber realm out to 2025, [announced](#) service officials on Wednesday. It highlights near term (out to Fiscal 2015), mid-term (Fiscal 2020), and far term (Fiscal 2025) approaches. Air Force Chief Scientist [Mark Maybury](#) led the study, supported by experts across the Air Force, US government, and industry. "Cyber Vision 2025 finds that our missions are at risk from malicious insiders, insecure supply chains, and increasingly sophisticated adversaries as well as growing (often cyber) systems interdependencies," reads the document's executive summary. Among its many recommendations, Cyber Vision 2025 calls for: integrating cyber across all core functions; improving cyber accessions and education and developing Air Force cyberspace elite forces; rapid, open, and iterative acquisition; requiring and designing-in security, and securing weapon systems throughout their lifecycle; and developing trusted and self-healing networks. Cyber Vision 2025, dated Dec. 13, 2012, but publicly released on March 27, follows the [Energy Horizons](#) and [Technology Horizons](#) vision documents that the chief scientist's office has released since 2010. Air Force officials "need to make hard decisions" in order to shape the service in the way "they believe it should be in the future," said [Maj. Gen. Robert Kane](#), global reach programs director in the Air Force Secretariat's acquisition office, on Wednesday. During a briefing sponsored by AFA's Mitchell Institute for Airpower Studies in Arlington, Va., Kane outlined a paper and an analytical model he helped create to assess the Air Force's value proposition to determine better pathways for the service's processes, such as budgeting, requirements, and acquisitions. Each of these Air Force processes has its own values and belief systems and "the key" is to bring them all together "and that's hard to do," he said during his March 27 presentation. The model analyzes the projected promise of value that the Air Force is expected to deliver, the trade space, and the core functions and enduring missions of Air Force communities.

President Obama signed into law H.R. 933, [appropriations legislation](#) that will fund the Defense Department and other government agencies through the remainder of the fiscal year. Obama inked the bill on March 26, [announced](#) the White House. His signature came one day before the expiration date of the budget continuing resolution under which DOD has been operating thus far in Fiscal 2013. H.R. 933 includes some \$518.1 billion in baseline defense funding, \$87.2 billion for overseas contingency operations, and \$10.6 billion for military construction. It provides some leeway for the services to reprogram funds across accounts to ease the stresses of budget sequestration.*

The Air Force has canceled the Red Flag-Alaska 13-2 exercise that was slated to take place in April, [announced](#) Pacific Air Forces officials on Wednesday. They cited "budgetary considerations" associated with sequestration as the reason. Air Force officials have previously warned that curtailing training exercises would be [one of the unavoidable consequences](#) of budget sequestration, which took effect on March 1, bringing with it severe spending cuts for the US military. PACAF considers RF-A to be its premier combat flying training exercise. It normally takes place for several weeks at Eielson AFB, Alaska, utilizing the Joint Pacific Alaskan Range Complex. US units from across the Pacific, along with British and Canadian forces, were scheduled to participate in this exercise iteration. "PACAF plans to honor the commitments made to our allies by extending an offer to them to continue to use the airspace and the range through unit-level training," states the command's March 27 release.

The Air Force has successfully completed the upgrade and transfer of its Military Personnel Data System to the Defense Enterprise Computing Center operated by the Defense Information Systems Agency, according to an Air Force Personnel Center release. Originally expected to require 23 days, the process took only 17 days, states the March 27 release. "We're pleased that the MilPDS upgrade took less time than anticipated, and we are well on our way to getting information updated in the system," said Joe Thele, Air Force Personnel Operations Agency director. AFPC Commander [Maj. Gen. A.J. Stewart](#) shut down MilPDS on March 4 so that [the upgrade could commence](#). MilPDS is the primary records database for airmen's personnel data. It was becoming old and more difficult to maintain, and there was concern that, without the overhaul, the service might lose irreplaceable data. (Randolph [report](#) by Debbie Gildea)

Two high school students from Valparaiso, Fla., have conducted research that provides insights that could help local residents dampen the noise that enters their homes from F-35 strike fighters operating

from nearby Eglin Air Force Base, [reported](#) the *Northwest Florida Daily News*. Eglin is home to F-35 training. As part of a school science project, junior Stefan Makarov and senior Jessica Sandlin of Rocky Bayou Christian School obtained a sound clip of an F-35, played it through speakers set up outside of a number of homes, and used a "sound isolation box" to record the decibels penetrating inside the homes, according to the newspaper's March 25 report. "Our hypothesis was the sound was most likely to come through the windows," said Makarov. "But we found out it came through the walls." In fact, they discovered that a hurricane-proof glass door absorbed sound better than vinyl siding, and that having several layers between living space and brick walls blocked out sound best.
