14. Today in History:

- 1794 Allies under the prince of Coburg defeat French forces at Le Cateau.
- <u>1795</u> <u>Partitions of Poland</u>: The <u>Duchy of Courland and Semigallia</u>, a northern <u>fief</u> of the <u>Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth</u>, ceases to exist and becomes part of Imperial Russia.
- <u>1809</u> <u>Peninsular War</u>: France defeats Spain in the <u>Battle of Medelin</u>.
- <u>1854</u> <u>Crimean War</u>: <u>France</u> and <u>Britain</u> declare war on <u>Russia</u>.
- 1860 First Taranaki War: The Battle of Waireka begins.
- 1862 American Civil War: <u>Battle of Glorieta Pass</u> in <u>New Mexico</u>, <u>Union</u> forces stop the <u>Confederate</u> invasion of <u>New Mexico</u> territory. The battle began on <u>March 26</u>.
- <u>1910</u> <u>Henri Fabre</u> becomes the first person to fly a <u>seaplane</u>, the <u>Fabre Hydravion</u>, after taking off from a water runway near <u>Martigues</u>, <u>France</u>.
- 1913 Guatemala becomes a signatory to the <u>Buenos Aires copyright treaty</u>.
- <u>1933</u> The <u>Imperial Airways</u> biplane *City of Liverpool* is believed to be the first airline lost to <u>sabotage</u> when a passenger <u>sets a fire on board</u>.
- <u>1939</u> <u>Spanish Civil War</u>: <u>Generalissimo Francisco Franco</u> conquers <u>Madrid</u> after a three-year siege.

- 1941 World War II: Battle of Cape Matapan in the Mediterranean Sea, British Admiral Andrew Browne Cunningham leads the Royal Navy in the destruction of three major Italian heavy cruisers and two destroyers.
- 1942 World War II: In occupied <u>France</u>, <u>British</u> naval forces successfully <u>raid</u> the <u>German</u>-occupied port of <u>St. Nazaire</u>.
- <u>1946 Cold War</u>: The <u>United States State Department</u> releases the <u>Acheson–Lilienthal Report</u>, outlining a plan for the international control of <u>nuclear power</u>.
- 1951 First Indochina War: In the Battle of Mao Khe, French Union forces, led by World War II hero Jean de Lattre de Tassigny, inflict a defeat on Việt Minh forces commanded by General Võ Nguyên Giáp.
- 1968 Brazilian high school student <u>Edson Luís de Lima Souto</u> is shot by the police in a protest for cheaper meals at a restaurant for low-income students. The aftermath of his death is one of the first major events against the military dictatorship.
- 1969 The McGill français movement protest occurs, the second largest protest in Montreal's history with 10,000 trade unionists, leftist activists, CEGEP students, and even some McGill students at McGill's Roddick Gates. This led to the majority of the protesters getting arrested.
- 1978 The <u>US Supreme Court</u> hands down 5-3 decision in <u>Stump v. Sparkman</u>, 435 U.S. 349, a controversial case involving involuntary <u>sterilization</u> and <u>judicial</u> <u>immunity</u>.
- 1979 Operators of <u>Three Mile Island</u>'s Unit 2 <u>nuclear reactor</u> outside of <u>Harrisburg, Pennsylvania</u> fail to recognize that a relief valve in the primary coolant system has stuck open following an unexpected shutdown. As a result, enough coolant drains out of the system to allow the core to overheat and partially melt down.
- 1990 President George H. W. Bush posthumously awards <u>Jesse Owens</u> the Congressional Gold Medal.
- 1994 In South Africa, Zulus and African National Congress supporters battle in central Johannesburg, resulting in 18 deaths.
- 1999 Kosovo War: Serb paramilitary and military forces kill 146 Kosovo Albanians in the Izbica massacre.
- 2000 Three children are killed when a <u>Murray County, Georgia</u>, school bus is hit by a <u>CSX</u> freight train.
- 2003 In a <u>friendly fire</u> incident, two <u>A-10 Thunderbolt II</u> attack aircraft from the <u>United States Idaho Air National Guard's 190th Fighter Squadron</u> attack <u>British</u> tanks participating in the <u>2003 invasion of Iraq</u>, killing British soldier <u>Matty Hull</u>.
- 2006 At least 1 million union members, students, and unemployed take to the streets in <u>France</u> in protest at the government's proposed <u>First Employment</u> Contract law.
