 1585 – The expedition organised by Sir Walter Raleigh departs England for Roanoke Island (now in North Carolina) to establish the Roanoke Colony.

- 1609 <u>Eighty Years' War</u>: <u>Spain</u> and the <u>Dutch Republic</u> sign the <u>Treaty of Antwerp</u> to initiate twelve years of truce.
- <u>1682</u> <u>Robert Cavelier de La Salle</u> discovers the mouth of the <u>Mississippi River</u>, claims it for France and names it Louisiana.
- <u>1782</u> <u>American War of Independence</u>: <u>Battle of the Saintes</u> begins.
- 1865 American Civil War: Robert E. Lee surrenders the Army of Northern
   <u>Virginia</u> (26,765 troops) to <u>Ulysses S. Grant</u> at <u>Appomattox Courthouse</u>, <u>Virginia</u>,
   effectively ending the war.
- 1867 Alaska purchase: Passing by a single vote, the <u>United States Senate</u> ratifies a <u>treaty</u> with <u>Russia</u> for the purchase of <u>Alaska</u>.
- 1909 The <u>U.S. Congress</u> passes the <u>Payne-Aldrich Tariff Act</u>.
- 1914 Mexican Revolution: One of the world's first naval/air skirmishes takes
  place off the coast of western Mexico.
- 1916 World War I: The <u>Battle of Verdun</u> <u>German</u> forces launch their third offensive of the battle.
- <u>1917</u> World War I: The <u>Battle of Arras</u> the battle begins with <u>Canadian Corps</u> executing a massive assault on <u>Vimy Ridge</u>.
- 1918 World War I: The <u>Battle of the Lys</u> the <u>Portuguese Expeditionary Corps</u> is crushed by the <u>German</u> forces during what is called the <u>Spring Offensive</u> on the <u>Belgian</u> region of <u>Flanders</u>.
- 1937 The <u>Kamikaze</u> arrives at <u>Croydon Airport</u> in <u>London</u> it is the first Japanese-built aircraft to fly to <u>Europe</u>.
- 1939 Marian Anderson sings at the <u>Lincoln Memorial</u>, after being denied the right to sing at the Daughters of the American Revolution's Constitution Hall.
- 1940 World War II: Operation Weserübung Germany invades Denmark and Norway.
- 1942 World War II: The <u>Battle of Bataan/Bataan Death March</u> <u>United States</u> forces surrender on the <u>Bataan Peninsula</u>. The <u>Japanese Navy</u> launches an air raid on <u>Trincomalee</u> in <u>Ceylon</u> (<u>Sri Lanka</u>); <u>Royal Navy aircraft carrier</u> <u>HMS Hermes</u> and <u>Royal Australian Navy Destroyer HMAS Vampire</u> are sunk off the island's east coast.
- 1945 World War II: The German pocket battleship Admiral Scheer is sunk.
- 1945 World War II: The <u>Battle of Königsberg</u>, in <u>East Prussia</u>, ends.
- 1945 The United States Atomic Energy Commission is formed.
- 1947 The <u>Journey of Reconciliation</u>, the first interracial <u>Freedom Ride</u> begins through the upper <u>South</u> in violation of <u>Jim Crow laws</u>. The riders wanted enforcement of the <u>United States Supreme Court</u>'s <u>1946 Irene Morgan</u> decision that banned racial segregation in interstate travel.
- 1948 Jorge Eliécer Gaitán's assassination provokes a violent riot in Bogotá (the Bogotazo), and a further ten years of violence in Colombia known as La violencia.
- 1948 Fighters from the <u>Irgun</u> and <u>Lehi Zionist</u> paramilitary groups attacked <u>Deir Yassin</u> near <u>Jerusalem</u>, <u>killing over 100</u>.
- 1952 <u>Hugo Ballivian</u>'s government is overthrown by the Bolivian National Revolution, starting a period of <u>agrarian reform</u>, <u>universal suffrage</u> and the <u>nationalisation</u> of tin mines

- 1957 The Suez Canal in Egypt is cleared and opens to shipping.
- <u>1959</u> <u>Project Mercury</u>: <u>NASA</u> announces the selection of the United States' first seven astronauts, whom the news media quickly dub the "Mercury Seven".
- <u>1961</u> The <u>Pacific Electric Railway</u> in <u>Los Angeles</u>, once the largest electric railway in the world, ends operations.
- 1965 <u>Astrodome</u> opens. First indoor <u>baseball</u> game is played.
- 1967 The first <u>Boeing 737</u> (a 100 series) makes its maiden flight.
- <u>1969</u> The "<u>Chicago Eight</u>" plead not guilty to federal charges of conspiracy to incite a riot at the 1968 Democratic National Convention in Chicago, Illinois.
- 1969 The first British-built <u>Concorde</u> 002 makes its maiden flight from <u>Filton</u> to RAF Fairford.
- <u>1975</u> The first game of the <u>Philippine Basketball Association</u>, the second oldest professional basketball league in the world.
- 1975 8 people in South Korea, who are involved in <u>People's Revolutionary Party Incident</u>, are hanged.
- <u>1980</u> The <u>Iraqi</u> regime of <u>Saddam Hussein</u> kills philosopher <u>Muhammad Baqir</u> al-Sadr and his sister Bint al-Huda after three days of torture.
- <u>1981</u> The <u>U.S. Navy</u> nuclear submarine <u>USS George Washington (SSBN-598)</u> accidentally collides with the *Nissho Maru*, a Japanese cargo ship, sinking it.
- 1989 The <u>April 9 tragedy</u> in <u>Tbilisi</u>, <u>Georgian</u> SSR an anti-Soviet peaceful demonstration and hunger strikes, demanding restoration of Georgian independence is dispersed by the <u>Soviet army</u>, resulting in 20 deaths and hundreds of injuries.
- <u>1992</u> A <u>U.S. Federal Court</u> finds former <u>Panamanian dictator</u> <u>Manuel Noriega</u> guilty of drug and racketeering charges. He is sentenced to 30 years in prison.
- 1992 <u>John Major</u>'s <u>Conservative Party</u> wins an unprecedented <u>fourth general</u> election victory in the United Kingdom.
- 2003 2003 invasion of Iraq: <u>Baghdad</u> falls to <u>American</u> forces; <u>Saddam Hussein</u> statue topples as <u>Iraqis</u> turn on symbols of their former leader, pulling down the statue and tearing it to pieces.
- 2005 Wedding of Charles, Prince of Wales and Camilla Parker Bowles;
   Charles, Prince of Wales marries Camilla Parker Bowles in a civil ceremony at Windsor's Guildhall.
- <u>2009</u> In <u>Tbilisi</u>, <u>Georgia</u>, up to 60,000 people <u>protest</u> against the government of Mikheil Saakashvili.
- <u>2011</u> <u>A gunman murdered five people</u>, injured eleven, and committed suicide in a mall in the Netherlands.
