#### **17.** Today in History:

- <u>1807</u> A grand jury indicts former <u>Vice President of the United States</u> <u>Aaron Burr</u> on a charge of <u>treason</u>.
- <u>1809</u> On the second and last day of the <u>Battle of Aspern-Essling</u> (near Vienna), <u>Napoleon</u> is repelled by an enemy army for the first time.
- <u>1816</u> A mob in <u>Littleport, Cambridgeshire</u>, England, <u>riots</u> over high unemployment and rising grain costs; the rioting spreads to <u>Ely</u> the next day.
- <u>1819</u> The <u>SS Savannah</u> leaves port at <u>Savannah</u>, <u>Georgia</u>, <u>United States</u>, on a voyage to become the first <u>steamship</u> to cross the <u>Atlantic Ocean</u>. The ship arrived at <u>Liverpool</u>, <u>England</u> on <u>June 20</u>.
- <u>1826</u> <u>HMS *Beagle*</u> departs on its first voyage.
- <u>1840</u> The <u>transportation</u> of <u>British convicts</u> to the <u>New South Wales colony</u> is abolished.
- <u>1848</u> <u>Slavery is abolished</u> in <u>Martinique</u>.

- <u>1856</u> <u>Congressman Preston Brooks</u> of <u>South Carolina</u> beats <u>Senator Charles</u> <u>Sumner</u> with a cane in the hall of the <u>United States Senate</u> for a speech Sumner had made attacking <u>Southerners</u> who sympathized with the pro-<u>slavery</u> violence in <u>Kansas</u> ("<u>Bleeding Kansas</u>").
- <u>1863</u> <u>American Civil War</u>: <u>Siege of Port Hudson</u> <u>Union</u> forces begin to lay <u>siege</u> to the <u>Confederate</u>-controlled <u>Port Hudson</u>, <u>Louisiana</u>.
- <u>1864</u> American Civil War: After ten weeks, the <u>Union Army</u>'s <u>Red River</u> <u>Campaign</u> ends with the Union unable to achieve any of its objectives.
- <u>1871</u> The <u>U.S. Army</u> issued an order for abandonment of <u>Fort Kearny</u> in <u>Nebraska</u>.
- <u>1872 Reconstruction</u>: <u>U.S. President Ulysses S. Grant</u> signs the <u>Amnesty Act</u> of <u>1872</u> into law restoring full <u>civil rights</u> to all but about 500 <u>Confederate</u> sympathizers.
- <u>1897</u> The <u>Blackwall Tunnel</u> under the <u>River Thames</u> is officially opened
- <u>1903</u> Launch of the <u>White Star Liner</u>, <u>SS Ionic</u>.
- 1906 The <u>Wright brothers</u> are granted <u>U.S.</u> patent number 821,393 for their "<u>Flying-Machine</u>".
- <u>1915</u> <u>Lassen Peak</u> erupts with a powerful force, and is the only mountain other than <u>Mount St. Helens</u> to erupt in the contiguous US during the 20th century.
- <u>1926</u> <u>Chiang Kai-shek</u> replaces communists in <u>Kuomintang</u> China
- <u>1939</u> <u>World War II</u>: <u>Germany</u> and <u>Italy</u> sign the <u>Pact of Steel</u>.
- <u>1942</u> <u>Mexico</u> enters <u>World War II</u> on the side of the <u>Allies</u>.
- 1942 The <u>Steel Workers Organizing Committee</u> disbands, and a new <u>trade</u> <u>union</u>, the <u>United Steelworkers</u>, is formed.
- 1942 World War II: <u>Ted Williams</u> of the <u>Boston Red Sox</u> enlists in the <u>United</u> <u>States Marine Corps</u> as a flight instructor.
- <u>1943</u> <u>Joseph Stalin</u> disbands <u>Comintern</u>.
- <u>1945</u> <u>Operation Paperclip</u> <u>United States Army</u> Major Robert B. Staver recommends that the U.S. evacuate <u>German</u> scientists and engineers to help in the development of <u>rocket</u> technology.
- <u>1947</u> <u>Cold War</u>: in an effort to fight the spread of <u>Communism</u>, <u>U.S. President</u> <u>Harry S. Truman</u> signs an act into law that will later be called the <u>Truman</u> <u>Doctrine</u>. The act grants <u>\$400</u> million in military and economic aid to <u>Turkey</u> and <u>Greece</u>, each battling an internal Communist movement.
- <u>1958</u> <u>Sri Lankan riots of 1958</u>: This riot is a watershed event in the race relationship of the various ethnic communities of Sri Lanka. The total number of deaths is estimated to be 300, mostly Sri Lankan <u>Tamils</u>.
- <u>1962</u> <u>Continental Airlines Flight 11</u> crashes after bombs explode on board.
- <u>1963</u> Assassination attempt of Greek left-wing politician <u>Gregoris Lambrakis</u>, who will die five days afterwards.
- <u>1964</u> <u>U.S. President Lyndon B. Johnson</u> announces the goals of his <u>Great</u> <u>Society</u> social reforms to bring an "end to poverty and racial injustice" in <u>America</u>.
- <u>1967</u> The <u>L'Innovation</u> department store in the centre of <u>Brussels</u>, <u>Belgium</u>, burns down. It is the most devastating fire in Belgian history, resulting in 323 dead and missing and 150 injured.
- 1967 <u>Vietnam War</u>: <u>Vinh Xuan massacre</u>.
- <u>1968</u> The nuclear-powered <u>submarine</u> the <u>USS Scorpion</u> sinks with 99 men aboard 400 miles southwest of the <u>Azores</u>.

- <u>1969</u> <u>Apollo 10</u>'s lunar module flies within 8.4 <u>nautical miles</u> (16 km) of the <u>moon</u>'s surface.
- <u>1972</u> <u>Ceylon</u> adopts a new <u>constitution</u>, thus becoming a <u>Republic</u>, changes its name to <u>Sri Lanka</u>, and joins the <u>Commonwealth of Nations</u>.
- <u>1980</u> <u>Namco</u> releases the highly influential <u>arcade game</u> <u>Pac-Man</u>.
- <u>1987</u> <u>Hashimpura massacre</u> in <u>Meerut</u> city of India.
- <u>1990</u> <u>North</u> and <u>South Yemen</u> are unified to create the <u>Republic of Yemen</u>.
- 1990 Microsoft releases the Windows 3.0 operating system.
- <u>1992</u> After 30 years, 66-year-old <u>Johnny Carson</u> hosts <u>The Tonight Show</u> for the last time.
- 1992 Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia and Slovenia join the United Nations.
- <u>1997</u> <u>Kelly Flinn</u>, <u>US Air Force</u>'s first female bomber pilot certified for combat, accepts a <u>general discharge</u> in order to avoid a <u>court martial</u>.
- <u>1998</u> <u>Lewinsky scandal</u>: a federal judge rules that <u>United States Secret Service</u> agents can be compelled to testify before a <u>grand jury</u> concerning the scandal, involving <u>President Bill Clinton</u>.
- <u>2002</u> In <u>Washington, D.C.</u>, the remains of the missing <u>Chandra Levy</u> are found in <u>Rock Creek Park</u>.
- 2002 <u>American civil rights movement</u>: a jury in <u>Birmingham</u>, <u>Alabama</u>, convicts former <u>Ku Klux Klan</u> member <u>Bobby Frank Cherry</u> of the <u>1963</u> murders of four girls in the <u>bombing of the 16th Street Baptist Church</u>.
- <u>2003</u> In <u>Fort Worth, Texas</u>, <u>Annika Sörenstam</u> becomes the first woman to play the <u>PGA Tour</u> in 58 years.
- <u>2004</u> The <u>U.S.</u> town of <u>Hallam, Nebraska</u>, is wiped out by a powerful <u>F4</u> <u>tornado</u> (part of the <u>May 2004 tornado outbreak sequence</u>) that broke a width record at an astounding 2.5 miles (4.0 km) wide, which kills one resident.
- <u>2008</u> The <u>Late-May 2008 tornado outbreak sequence</u> unleashes 235 <u>tornadoes</u>, including an <u>EF4</u> and an <u>EF5</u> tornado, between May 22 and May 31, 2008. The tornadoes struck 19 <u>states</u> and one <u>Canadian province</u>.
- <u>2011</u> An <u>EF5</u> Tornado strikes <u>Joplin</u>, <u>Missouri</u> killing 161 people</u>, the single deadliest tornado in the <u>United States</u> since modern record keeping began in 1950.
- <u>2012</u> <u>Tokyo Skytree</u> is opened to public. Its the <u>tallest tower in world</u> (634 m), and the second tallest man-made structure on Earth, after <u>Burj Khalifa</u> (829.8 m).
