- <u>1966</u> Former <u>Congolese</u> Prime Minister <u>Evariste Kimba</u> and several other politicians are publicly executed in <u>Kinshasa</u> on the orders of President <u>Joseph</u> <u>Mobutu</u>.
- 1966 Launch of <u>Surveyor 1</u> the first US spacecraft to achieve landing on an extraterrestrial body.

- 1972 In <u>Tel Aviv</u>, <u>Israel</u>, members of the <u>Japanese Red Army</u> carry out the <u>Lod</u> <u>Airport Massacre</u>, killing 24 people and injuring 78 others.
- <u>1974</u> The <u>Airbus A300</u> passenger aircraft first enters service.
- <u>1989</u> <u>Tiananmen Square protests of 1989</u>: the 33-foot high "<u>Goddess of</u> <u>Democracy</u>" <u>statue</u> is unveiled in <u>Tiananmen Square</u> by student demonstrators.
- 1998 <u>Nuclear Testing</u>: Pakistan conducts an underground test in the <u>Kharan</u> <u>Desert</u>. It is reported to be a plutonium device with yield of 20kt.
